# American Medical Women's Association 2025 AWARDS

#### Presidential Award for Medicine - Charlene M. Dewey, MD, MEd, MACP



Dr. Dewey is a full professor, Assistant Dean for Educator Development and Co-Director of the Center for Professional Health, chair of the Faculty Wellness Committee and past chair of the Faculty Senate at Vanderbilt University. She is a highly sought-after expert and educator in proper prescribing of controlled prescription drugs/opioid management and the professional health and wellness of the healthcare practitioner, including overall wellbeing, stress, stress management, burnout and impairment prevention. Dr. Dewey has been recognized with numerous awards for her contributions to teaching, patient care and community service. She is a member of Vanderbilt University School of Medicine's Academy for Excellence in Education, YWCA Academy for Women of Achievement (2015) and winner of the

2013 Athena International Award. Dr. Dewey was honored by Bradley University with the Distinguished Alumni Award and the Bradley University Orville Nohdurft Lifetime Achievement Award. She has two named scholarships in her honor and is a 2-time recipient of the Vanderbilt 5-Star Award for 100% Patient Satisfaction. Dr. Dewey is a graduate of Morehouse School of Medicine and University of Houston.

## Presidential Award for Humanitarianism - Anita Ravi, MD, MPH, MSHP, FAAFP



Dr. Anita Ravi is a family medicine physician, educator, and health policy leader dedicated to transforming healthcare for survivors of gender-based violence (GBV), including human trafficking, domestic violence, and sexual assault. As CEO and Founder of PurpLE Health Foundation, she leads a multidisciplinary team advancing GBV care as a recognized field in medicine, through a novel model of clinical care, clinician training, and survivor employment. Dr. Ravi's work with survivors informs her innovative approach to clinician training and systemic reform, which she amplifies using drawing and storytelling. Her impact, spanning local / national policy and advisory groups, peer-

reviewed research and national media, has been recognized with numerous awards, including the distinguished Rockefeller Foundation Bellagio Center Residency. She is a graduate of Washington University in St. Louis, University of Michigan SOM, Yale University (MPH), and University of Pennsylvania SOM (MSHP). Currently, Dr. Ravi is a National Academy of Medicine Fellow, where she focuses on traumatic brain injury and other critical issues affecting the health of GBV survivors.

#### Presidential Award for Leadership – Women's Wellbeing through Equity and Leadership (WEL) Program



The Women's Wellbeing through Equity and Leadership project (WEL) is a collaborative effort to engage a diverse group of early- to mid-career women physicians in networking, mentorship, and training around wellbeing, equity and leadership. Led by the American Academy of Pediatrics (AAP), WEL is a partnership between 10 medical associations: AAP, American Academy of Family Physicians (AAFP), American College of Obstetricians and

Gynecologists (ACOG), American College of Physicians (ACP), American Hospital Association (AHA), American Medical Association (AMA), American Medical Women's Association (AMWA), American Psychiatric Association (APA), National Hispanic Medical Association (NHMA) and National Medical Association (NMA). Funded by The Physicians Foundation, WEL seeks to foster the development of the next wave of women physician leaders to build healthier, more equitable work environments and experiences.

#### Presidential Award for Improving Clinical Practice - Institute for Exceptional Care



IEC (Institute for Exceptional Care) is a national nonprofit working to make healthcare better and safer for people with intellectual and/or developmental disabilities (IDD). IEC partners with people with lived experience of IDD, family members, and healthcare professionals to change the way care is taught, delivered, and paid for by creating tools, programs, and campaigns.

## Elizabeth Blackwell Award - Reshma Jagsi, MD, DPhil



Dr. Reshma Jagsi is the Lawrence W. Davis Professor and Chair of the Department of Radiation Oncology and a Senior Faculty Fellow in the Center for Ethics at Emory University. Dr. Jagsi has been elected to the National Academy of Medicine, Association of American Physicians, and American Society of Clinical Investigation in recognition of her work to promote equity in health outcomes of patients and in career outcomes of physicians, specifically focusing on women. Author of over 450 publications including high-impact studies in the New England Journal of Medicine, JAMA, and the Lancet, she is PI of multiple NIH grants, including two active R01s and a U54. A radiation oncologist who cares for patients with breast cancer, she is a fellow of the AAAS, ASCO, ASTRO, AAWR, and the Hastings Center.

### Women in Science Award - Hoda Anton-Culver, PhD



Dr. Hoda Anton-Culver is a Donald Bren Professor and Distinguished Professor in the Department of Medicine at the UC Irvine School of Medicine. She received her PhD in Epidemiology from University of St. Andrews in Scotland. She is the Founding Chair of the Department of Epidemiology and graduate PhD and MS degrees in Epidemiology at UC Irvine and Director of the UCI Genetic Epidemiology Research Institute which focuses on integration of research, education, and community efforts. Her research takes advantage of population genetics to predict the proportion of disease attributed to genetic variation and exposure to environmental risk factors, focusing on cancer etiology and population-based precision medicine with special emphasis on molecular genetic characterization, genetic-phenotype correlation, and genotype-environment interaction associated with disease causation. Dr. Anton-Culver leads precision medicine research programs as the Principal Investigator of the NIH funded All of Us Research Program's Southern California Consortium at UC Irvine.

#### Women in Science Award - Martha K. Terris, MD, FACS



Dr. Martha K. Terris is Professor and Chair of the Department of Urology, holding the Witherington Distinguished Chair in Urology at the Medical College of Georgia at Augusta University. She was a founding member of the Shared Equal Access Regional Cancer Hospital (SEARCH) Database. Her continued collaboration with database research as well as with leaders in urologic basic science has generated significant grant funding and over 350 peer-reviewed manuscripts. Dr. Terris joined the faculty at the Medical College of Georgia and the Augusta Veterans Affairs Medical Center in 2002 as Professor of Urology and Chief of Urology at the Charlie Norwood Veterans Affairs Medical Center where she started the robotic surgery program. Dr. Terris' recent honors include being named Best Doctors in America and Top Doctors in cancer repeatedly, Urology Practice reviewer of the Year, the American Urological Association Distinguished Service Award, and is currently

president-elect of the Georgia Urological Association.

## Bertha Van Hoosen Award – Susan Thompson Hingle, MD, MACP, FRCP, FAMWA



Dr. Susan Hingle is Professor of Medicine and Medical Humanities, Associate Dean for Human and Organizational Potential, and Chair of the Department of Medical Humanities at Southern Illinois University School of Medicine. She earned a bachelor's degree from Miami University and a medical degree from Rush University Medical College. She completed an Internal Medicine residency at Georgetown University Medical Center. Dr. Hingle is a graduate of the Executive Leadership in Academic Medicine Program. She has been active nationally in the American Medical Women's Association, the American College of Physicians, the Alliance of Academic Internal Medicine, and the American Medical Association. She is currently President of AMWA and previously served as Chair of the ACP Board of Regents and Board of Governors. Dr. Hingle strongly believes that women in medicine have enormous potential to influence the profession and society for the better.

#### Lila A. Wallis Women's Health Award – Jennifer H. Mieres, MD, FACC, MASNC, FAHA



Dr. Jennifer H. Mieres is Professor of Cardiology and Associate Dean of Faculty Affairs at the Zucker School of Medicine at Hofstra Northwell and Senior Vice President of Northwell Health's, Center for Equity of Care, where she leads diversity and health equity initiatives. A graduate of Bennington College and Boston University School of Medicine, she is a Fellow of the AHA, ACC, and Master of the ASNC, serving as its first female President. Dr. Mieres has authored over 75 publications, including the AHA's cardiac imaging guidelines for women, and co-authored Heart Smarter for Women. She also produced the Emmy-nominated documentary A Woman's Heart and the award-winning Ms. Diagnosed. Dr. Mieres is a nationally recognized leader in cardiovascular care and health equity.

# Lila A. Wallis Women's Health Award – Stacey E. Rosen, MD, FAHA



Dr. Stacey E. Rosen is the Executive Director for Northwell's Katz Institute for Women's Health, the Partners Council Professor of Women's Health and Professor of Cardiology at the Zucker School of Medicine at Hofstra/Northwell. Dr. Rosen oversees women's health services at Northwell with a focus on the elimination of healthcare disparities through comprehensive clinical programs, sex-and-gender based research, community partnerships and education. Dr. Rosen has been practicing cardiology for over 30 years and co-authored, Heart Smarter for Women: Six Weeks to a Healthier Heart. A longtime volunteer for the American Heart Association (AHA), Dr. Rosen serves as the AHA President-elect 2024-2025, received the 2018 AHA Women in Cardiology Mentoring Award, the 2021 AHA Physician of the Year Award and is the 2023 recipient of the WomenHeart Wenger Award for Excellence in Medical Advocacy. Dr. Rosen was named to Modern Healthcare's 50 Most Influential Clinical Executives class of 2024.

#### Esther Pohl Lovejoy Award - Gloria A Bachmann, MD, MMS



Dr. Gloria Bachmann graduated from Rutgers University (RU) and Univ. of Pennsylvania (U of P), Perlman School of Medicine, where she completed Ob/Gyn residency. At Rutgers Robert Wood Johnson Medical School (RWJMS), she is Professor of Ob/Gyn & Medicine, Associate Dean for Women's Health, Co-director of the Women's Health Institute, and Medical Director of the PROUD Gender Center of NJ. Also at RU, she is a steering committee member of the Global Health and the Rutgers Institute for Corporate Social Innovation (RICSI) Advisory Committee. She is medical director of the NJ Reentry Commission, serving previously incarcerated individuals. For her contributions to health care, she was a 2024 Fellow inductee into the New York Academy of Medicine. She is an AMWA Fellow, serving on the Music & Medicine

(Co-Chair) and Nutrition Committees.

# Early Career Physician Award - Tiffani Bell Washington MD, MPH, FAPA, DABOM, DABLM



Dr. Tiffani Bell Washington is a quadruple board-certified psychiatrist specializing in pediatric and adult psychiatry, obesity medicine, and lifestyle medicine. She advocates for integrative approaches to mental health and wellness, blending evidence-led treatments with holistic care. Dr. Washington founded The Healthy Weigh MD, a concierge practice focused on lifestyle psychiatry and weight management for women and children. An accomplished author and speaker, her work addresses joy, resilience, and thriving amidst life's demands. Dr. Washington received an MPH from the Harvard T.H. Chan School of Public Health and is pursuing an executive MBA at Yale SOM. She is on faculty at Massachusetts General Hospital and Medical Director for Elevance Health. She serves on the AMA Governing Council as Vice-Chair of the Women Physicians

Section. As a mom of five, she inspires others to balance career, family, and purpose while choosing joy and promoting health.

#### Dr. Larry Zaroff Man of Good Conscience Award – Jerry Kruse, MD, MSPH



Dr. Jerry Kruse is dean and provost of Southern Illinois University School of Medicine and CEO of SIU Medicine. He is a tenured professor of family and community medicine and medical education and served as executive associate dean of SIU SOM from 2013-15. At SIU, Dr. Kruse has also served as chair of the Dept. of Family & Community Medicine (16 yrs), director of the Quincy Family Medicine Residency Program (12 yrs), and director of Quincy Family Medicine's Clinical Operations and Complex Office Laboratory. He is former chair of the SIU SOM curriculum committee and Educational Policy Council (11 yrs) and served on the Tenure and Promotion Committee (4 yrs). As a thought leader in family medicine, he advocates for innovation in medical education and the advancement of health care systems. He has held

major organizational roles to represent primary care and graduate education, address quality issues and advance the health care workforce. His focus is to fulfill the Triple Aim + 1: medical education and health care that are more effective, efficient, equitable and enjoyable for all.

# Anne C. Carter Leadership Award - Alex Schick, BA



Alex Schick is a 3<sup>rd</sup> year medical student at the University of Rochester and an active member of AMWA since 2020 when she joined as a premedical student. As President of her AMWA branch for the past two years, Alex has grown the membership to over 100, expanding their reach, spearheading an inaugural Women in Medicine Conference, and fostering mentorship and networking opportunities among students and physicians through student-faculty mixers, mentorship panels, and a Women in Medicine mini-speaker series. In addition to her chapter-level achievements, Alex's has also participated in national leadership as Region 2 Director and Philanthropy/Fundraising Chair for AMWA's National Student Division.

## Anne C. Carter Leadership Award – Ariana Traub, MPH



Ariana M. Traub, MPH, is a 4<sup>th</sup> year medical student at Emory University SOM with a strong commitment to reproductive health and medical education. She graduated from Brandeis University (BS, 2018) and New York University (MPH, 2019). Before medical school, she worked in USAID's Pediatric and Maternal HIV Branch. At Emory, Ariana has served as a student coordinator for the Harriet Tubman Women's Clinic, Georgia Asylum Team Director for Physicians for Human Rights, and ACOG's District IV Junior Fellow. She co-founded Georgia Health Professionals for Reproductive Rights, a coalition of 650+healthcare professionals advocating for reproductive healthcare. The organization has petitioned Georgia legislators, spoken at press conferences, engaged in media advocacy, published peer-reviewed work, and secured the first abortion-related

resolution passed by the Medical Association of Georgia. Ariana will begin her OBGYN residency in July.

# Humanitarian Award — Florida State University



The Undergraduate Chapter of AMWA at Florida State University has contributed to the local community through service projects and partnerships. Our Service Project Committee spearheaded initiatives with Big Brothers Big Sisters of the Big Bend, including revitalizing an outdoor space at their facility and participating in the Bowling for Kids' Sake fundraiser.
