AMWA Participates in Initiative to Raise Awareness of Thyroid Disease

nationwide study found that women are 5 to 8 times more likely than men to suffer from an overactive or underactive thyroid and about 1 in 8 women will develop a thyroid disorder during her lifetime. To increase awareness of thyroid disease, the American Medical Women's Association and Olympic gold medalist Gail Devers have joined forces with Knoll Pharmaceuticals to launch "Your Thyroid: Gland Central," a nationwide campaign to help answer the need for thyroid disease. Loren Wissner Greene, MD, AMWA spokesperson and clinical associated professor of medicine at New York University Medical Center, says the campaign "is a wake up call to American women about a disorder that affects five to eight times as many women as men." The launch event, held in New York's Grand Central Terminal, offered free thyroid screening to the public. Other stops for "Gland Central" include Chicago, Atlanta, and Los Angeles, where AMWA was represented by Drs. Carol Teutsch, Nancy Church, and

AMWA President Debra R. Judelson. These events received widespread media coverage and resulted in the screening of more than 1,300 people for thyroid disease.

Working to Place More Women in Key Leadership Positions

AMWA has been actively participating in the Coalition for Women's Appointments, a multi-partisan group of 60 organizations representing women in various professions who are interested in promoting women for top-level policy-making positions in the federal government. Convened by the National Women's Political Caucus, the Coalition has compiled names for each newly elected Administration since 1976. It is divided into 11 task forces, each representing a substantive area of government service. AMWA's Executive Director, Eileen McGrath, JD, served in the Coalition in 1992 and currently chairs the Health and Human Services, Science, and Medicine Task Force.

On Thursday, November 14, 1996, the Coalition

released its first list of women who qualify as potential top-level appointees. Among the AMWA members on the list were Susan Blumenthal, MD, MPA; Karen Hein, MD; and Felicia Stewart, MD.

The second list was released in mid-December and included AMWA Past-President Mary Jane England, MD, and AMWA member Olga Jonasson, MD.

The Coalition was pleased that President Bill Clinton recently nominated Madeleine Albright for Secretary of State, Alexis Herman for Secretary of Labor, and Aida Alvarez for Administrator of the Small Business Administration. Both Albright and Herman were recommended by the Coalition.

The Coalition for Women's Appointments plans to send four more lists to the White House Staff. If you would like to be recommended, or know someone who would, please contact Jackie Nichols at AMWA's National Office.

PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

Looking to the Past and Establishing Future Goals

The start of the new year provides us with an opportunity to look back on our past year's accomplishments and establish goals for 1997. AMWA can be very proud of its achievements under Dr. Jean Fourcroy's presidency during 1996. Some of our successes and progress are

detailed in the Executive Director's Report. Of particular note is Dr. Fourcroy's leadership in updating our computer and phone system, improving our ability to communicate with one another using the latest technologies. Whether we were fighting battles over late-term abortion or Medicaid funding for women and children, Dr. Fourcroy's voice as AMWA's spokesperson remained strong. Her decades of protest over female genital mutilation received particular attention in 1996; Dr. Fourcroy conducted a session at a workshop on this topic held by Secretary of Health and Human Services' Dr. Donna Shalala's Office, as well as drafted articles on the issue and supported numerous national and international legislative efforts aimed at ending the practice of female genital mutilation.

AMWA's goals for the upcoming year must include making use of our new technologies to enhance communication throughout our membership. I have a particular interest in increasing the involvement of AMWA members who do not attend the Annual Meeting in the work of our committees and task forces. This will take a lot of effort, as the committees will need to communicate more clearly their goals and workplans for the upcoming year, so members who do not attend the meetings will understand how they can participate. The results should provide a greater understanding and appreciation by our membership of what we do as an organization.

Another goal for AMWA is to continue to raise our visibility to the public and medical profession through a variety of programs and publications. Our sponsorship of educational TV shows, continuing medical education, medical publications, and conferences, as well as presence and participation in national meetings, help us further this goal. I was particularly pleased to attend the American Medical Association's (AMA's) interim meeting this past December as the AMA alternate delegate, along with AMWA Past President Dr. Diana Dell, who serves as our

AMA delegate. There we were able to network with a number of women physicians and discuss issues of common interest, such as the advantages of working within a number of organizations simultaneously.

At our January 1997 President's Retreat, AMWA's leadership focused on Strategic Planning, the results of which will be provided in the next newsletter.

A final note to all: the new year is also an opportunity to focus on your own plans for the new year. Review and reassess your goals, including your own personal health habits and obtain the medical evaluation and care you need and deserve. Often, physicians are too caught up in caring for others, and we forget that our own health is important to our families and friends as well as to ourselves. Spend a few moments each day in brisk exercise and set aside time for quiet contemplation each day. Here's to a happy and healthy new year!

GRANT PROJECT UPDATE

Tobacco Control Achievements

AMWA is proud to announce the receipt of a grant from the Robert Wood Johnson Foundation (RWJ) to assist in disseminating the Agency for Health Care Policy and Research (AHCPR) clinical practice guideline on smoking cessation. This is an historic opportunity because it is the first time AMWA has secured financial support from this prestigious foundation. AMWA will collaborate with the American College of Obstetricians and Gynecologists (ACOG) on a unique master faculty training program.

The project includes two components, the first of which is distributing the pocket guideline to all AMWA members. Materials stressing the importance of smoking cessation counseling and providing information about women patients who smoke will be included with the guidelines. The second part of the project focuses on the development of a master faculty training program in partnership with ACOG. Five physician members from each organization will be trained to use the guideline effectively. Once trained, these physicians will each deliver two workshops to ensure that physicians across the country have sufficient knowledge and training to use the AHCPR guideline. Sally Faith Dorfman, MD, MSHSA, who was on the panel that developed the guideline, will serve as the faculty chair of the project. She will collaborate with AMWA member Michele Bloch, MD, PhD, and other national tobacco control experts to ensure that women's health issues concerning cessation are adequately addressed.

AMWA has written a series of articles on women, girls, and smoking to be disseminated through 10,000 weekly and local newspapers across the United States. The articles will begin appearing early in the New Year when smokers often resolve to quit. Keep your eye out for the articles, and keep us informed if you see them in your local papers!

Michele Bloch, MD, PhD, Chair of AMWA's Tobacco Control Sub-Committee, continues to make presentations on tobacco control, including a January presentation to women and girls with AMWA members enrolled at Georgetown, Howard, and George Washington University medical schools. If you are interested in giving a presentation on tobacco control, slides and talking points are available from the National Office for your use. In addition, tobacco control posters and t-shirts designed by AMWA to counter the Virginia Slims "It's a Woman Thing" campaign are also available to members. Please

call us to receive these promotional materials if you or your AMWA branch are planning a tobacco control activity. However, please note that a limited supply is available.

Reproductive Health Elective Coming Soon!

AMWA's Reproductive Health Fourth-Year Elective Curriculum is in the final stages of production and will be available for purchase by the end of January. The seven-module curriculum provides comprehensive instruction in reproductive health, an area often not well addressed in medical school. Medical schools that implement the curriculum will receive a copy at no charge. The AMWA National Office will match fourth-year students with schools hosting the elective.

Television Show to Address Herpes

AMWA is sponsoring the first of a television series on sexual health to be aired on the Discovery Channel. The first show in the series will be aired on January 30 and February 27 at 7:00 am EST. Additional airings on cable stations throughout the country will start in February. The program will address current advances in genital herpes treatment. An 800 number is also being established so that viewers can request free copies of the video. "The Cutting Edge Medical Report" is a nationally syndicated television series created by the Information Television Network. The program on genital herpes is produced in cooperation with AMWA and is made possible through an unrestricted grant from SmithKline Beecham.

Executive Director's Report

1996 marked AMWA achievements in a number of areas, some of which are highlighted below:

Raising Awareness of Women's Health Issues—AMWA made great strides in increasing awareness of women's health issues through such efforts as the publication of a series of 10 trade paperbacks based on the acclaimed The Women's Complete Healthbook. AMWA also partnered with a range of organizations to promote women's health issues; with DHHS' Office on Women's Health, AMWA co-sponsored four 30-minute shows on women's health issues as part of ITV's Cutting Edge Medical Report, which aired on the Discovery Channel and continue to air on cable throughout the country; conducted a Louis Harris Survey and editorial roundtable on women's health and nutrition (funded through an unrestricted educational grant from the National Association of Margarine Manufacturers); and with Knoll Pharmaceuticals and Olympian Gail Devers, sponsored four thyroid screenings and public education events in key media markets.

Membership Activities—1996 activities included the launch of the Kathryn Sowell Member-Get-A-Member Campaign; promotions targeting more than 80,000 women physicians, graduating student members, and resident members; exhibits at national conferences; as well as formation of a Branch Development Task Force to support and expand AMWA's 71 active physician branches and 117 active student branches. AMWA initiated new members in several branches and increased the number of regular members who renew. AMWA, like all other leading medical organizations, experienced a decline in the number of new members but has developed innovative promotions to attract new members in the coming year.

Communications—JAMWA staff continued to produce outstanding journal issues on such key topics as tobacco use, domestic violence, and race/ethnicity. In the area of electronic communications, AMWA President Debra Judelson, MD, expanded AMWA's website and Angela Tiberio, MD, Chair of the Electronic Media Pathways Task Force, surveyed members on their computer and online needs and capabilities. AMWA leaders addressed important women's health issues at media and other events and through testimony before the FDA and legislative bodies at the national and state levels including, but not limited to, Drs. Debra R. Judelson, Jean Fourcroy, Laura Morris, Diana Dell, Lila Wallis, Patricia Davidson, Loren Wissner Greene, Jo-Ellyn Ryall, Nancy Church, Carol Teutsch, Kristene Whitmore, Roselyn P. Epps, and Michele Bloch. AMWA would like to thank all who have represented AMWA over the past year. AMWA's legislative activities included lobbying and support for funding in key areas of women's

health; preventing insurers from discriminating against consumers and supporting health insurance portability; prohibiting the military from discharging those who test HIV positive; prohibiting tobacco companies from targeting children; and preventing Congress from legislating medical decision-making.

Educational Efforts—AMWA's Women's Health Curriculum is now an enduring CME distributed to primary care physicians in managed care organizations. The Reproductive Health Curriculum was completed and will be available the end of January. Also of note, AMWA served as a CME joint sponsor for several national conferences and presented 42 CME workshops in breast and cervical cancer screening through a CDC grant; 146 CME workshops in cardiovascular disease in women, sponsored by Dupont Radiopharmaceuticals; and a CME program on depression in women through an unrestricted educational grant from Eli Lilly. In addition, AMWA continued its CDC-funded tobacco control and prevention project, providing trainings in tobacco control advocacy and how to reach young girls, women, and health care providers with key messages on the dangers of tobacco use. AMWA also sponsored a conference on women and smoking with the PHS' Office on Women's Health and an AMWA Summit on Women and Smoking.

The year's successes are noteworthy and should serve as a challenge to AMWA members, leaders, and staff to further extend AMWA's influence in 1997.

A re you online? Do you have Internet access? Have you learned how to navigate on the world wide web? I would encourage you to use AMWA as the rock that keeps you grounded in why you chose to go to medical school in the first place.

Our suggestions for winter/spring program activities include an evening for discussion of maternity in medicine, the transition to clerkships or internships, or how to mentor younger students coming along behind you.

Reach out to other branches for support. Contact your regional coordinator and find out what other branches, student and physician, are doing in your area. Attend regional conferences or help plan a conference in your region.
